A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HALTOM CITY, TEXAS, ADOPTING A PARKS AND OPEN SPACE MASTER PLAN.

WHEREAS, the City Council of Haltom City, Texas authorized the development of a Parks and Open Space Master Plan for the City of Haltom City, Texas with assistance from the Haltom City Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and City staff; and

WHEREAS, a quality park system is a key component of the quality of life in Haltom City, Texas; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to be proactive in the management and development of its park system and open space areas; and

WHEREAS, upon full review and consideration of the City's Parks and Open Space Master Plan, and all matters related thereto, the City Council is of the opinion and finds that the Plan should be adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HALTOM CITY, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1.

The Parks & Open Space Master Plan 2019-2029 is hereby approved and adopted. Future decisions of the City regarding the development of the park system shall be made after consulting the Parks & Open Space Master Plan.

INTRODUCTION

The 2019 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan is designed to:

- Serve the purpose of providing an extensive information structure to help inform and guide decisions related to parks, recreation and open space.
- Set guidelines for existing park upgrades and future park and open space developments in conformity with citizen desires that are attainable for Haltom City.
- **Be achievable and provide tangible results.**

The service area of this plan includes everything within the city limits of Haltom City and presents Park and Open Space recommendations through the year of 2029. For this plan, more emphasis and detailed cost projections are provided for projects recommended for implementation through 2029.

This Plan should be examined and amended in order to remain meaningful to the City of Haltom City. It is important to note that typically plans are updated every five years with revisions so the unique and changing needs of Haltom City can be amply served.





External Influences

Haltom City is located four miles Northeast of Fort Worth in central Tarrant County, Texas. The City is served by Birdville Independent School District and surrounded on the Northwest, West and South by Fort Worth; on the east by Richland Hills and North Richland Hills; and on the Northeast by Watauga. Haltom City is bordered by the Trinity river and bisected by both Big and Little Fossil Creeks. The City is in the Cross Timbers ecoregion of Texas.

Haltom City is bisected by Loop 820 with easy access to Interstate 35 and Interstate 30. The City is close to DFW and Alliance airports. The City is traversed by five major roads: State Highway 121-Airport Freeway; State Highway 183-Northeast 28th Street-Midway Road; U.S. Highway 377- E Belknap Street-Denton Highway; Loop 452-Grapevine Highway 26; and Northeast Loop 820. Since the availability of 820 as a major thoroughfare, a long list of freight carriers provide service to the City.

LOCAL DEMOGRAPHICS





PARK CLASSIFICATION & INVENTORY

In order to better understand the Park System in Haltom City, MHS Planning and Design completed an inventory of current assets. This was useful in two ways: to assess the parks and open space system and to get a feel of the community. Facilities available were analyzed, as well as the quality of the parks. Every site was inventoried based on a set of standards from the National Recreation and Park Association.

The City's park classification system is broken down into five major categories. These park categories are as follows:

Pocket/Ornamental Parks

A pocket or ornamental park is a small (usually less than 1 acre) park developed with passive elements such as sidewalks, fountains, gazebos, plazas, benches and/or landscaping.

Playground Parks

A playground park is usually a 2 to 5 acre site and serves the area within a 0.25 mile radius with primarily active recreational opportunities. Facilities commonly found in a playground parks include swings, slides, climbing apparatus, picnic areas, spraygrounds, open turf areas and benches.

Neighborhood Parks

A neighborhood park is a site of approximately 5 to 10 acres and serves the area within a one-half mile radius with both active and passive recreational opportunities. Facilities typically found in neighborhood parks include play apparatus, picnic areas, shelters, play courts, unlighted play fields, restrooms, walking/jogging trails, natural open space, parking, spraygrounds, and tennis courts.

Community Parks

A community park is a site of approximately 40 to 150 acres with a service radius area of two miles. Facilities usually included in community parks are tennis courts, shelters, separate or multipurpose sports fields, play apparatus, picnic areas, walking/jogging trails, recreation centers, spraygrounds, open space and restrooms.

PARK CLASSIFICATION & INVENTORY

Greenbelts

Greenbelts or greenbelt parkways are linear parks usually developed around a natural resource such as a creek, river, utility easement, or lake shore. The potential benefits of a greenbelt system are numerous. Not only can a greenbelt system preserve valuable open space and natural habitat, it can provide a natural environment for walking, jogging, and bicycling trails, provide a transportation corridor linking neighborhoods to parks, schools, and shopping areas and provide a variety of passive recreational opportunities free, or relatively free, from automobile interference. Greenbelts also serve as natural buffers between land uses, serve as utility (underground) easements, and can usually be acquired at a relatively inexpensive price due to the restrictions on development. Design standards for greenbelts are relatively loose in order to allow the maximum use of the natural environment in the design. Greenbelt corridor widths are often determined by the existing topography, severity of flooding, and other unique natural features. Greenbelt corridors of less than fifty (50) "usable" feet should be avoided and narrow corridor sections kept to a minimum. One-hundred foot corridor widths and wider give flexibility in design and are encouraged wherever possible.



METHODOLOGY

➔ Existing Park System

The parks and open space system in the City of Haltom City was inventoried to examine how parks are laid out in the City. The inventory covered parks, open spaces and recreational resources. The inventory process examined city owned parks and recreational opportunities available to the public such as school campuses.


In order to better understand the true needs of Haltom City's Parks and Open Space system:

- The Level of Service analysis was created to compare developed park acreage to the current population
- The park system was compared to national standards established in the Park Recreation and Open Space Guideline Reports created by the National Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Guidelines
- Public Input meetings were conducted in order to gain beneficial insight into the wants and needs of the citizens regarding the future of the Parks and Recreation System in Haltom City
- A citizen survey was distributed to gain insight from the residents regarding the park system of Haltom City



The team developed park projects and upgrades for the next decade to guide the future for Haltom City Parks, Recreation & Open Space System.






How would you rate the existing parks and recreational facilities in Haltom City?

How would you describe the level of maintenance in the Parks and Recreation facilities?





Are additional parks and recreational facilities needed in Haltom City?




Can you reasonably walk to a City Park?


In regards to Indoor Recreation should the City?






How should the City inform the public of upcoming events?





What Additional Facilities would you like to have in Haltom City parks?







More Community Parks?

(10 acres in size)




More Pocket or Ornamental Parks?
(40 to 150 acres in size)








Residential neighborhoods, schools and parks should be connected with linear parks such as trails along creeks and other corridors.



What is the role of parks, recreation and open space in Haltom City today compared to ten years ago?




What is the most important consideration regarding future parks in Haltom City?






In addition to state grants, municipal bonds should be used to assist in funding the development and maintenance of parks in Haltom City.

PARKS GOAL & OBJECTIVES

- ***To provide a stable park system which meets the recreational and functional needs of the citizens of the City while supporting a unique community identity.***
- To continue to renovate and update parks throughout the entire park system in order to satisfy the needs of all citizens
- To work cooperatively with schools and other sport organizations to better manage usage of sport facilities
- To develop a park system that provides economic benefits to the community
- To continuously increase maintenance, walkability, beautification, safety and connectivity of the existing park system
- To enact a cost-effective management plan to revitalize the recreation center
- To continue to research the feasibility of redeveloping North Park as the premier park and gateway into the City
- To implement new programs and events throughout the City to better serve the community
- To partner with Texas Parks and Wildlife to receive grants to help fund the revitalization of the park system
- To provide unique programming and branding to help with the redevelopment of the under-served parks




GOALS & OBJECTIVES

OPEN SPACE GOAL & OBJECTIVES

- ***To continuously establish, preserve and conserve natural open spaces for recreation, essential aesthetic value and protection of valuable ecosystems.***
- To address safety concerns along greenbelts and trails by incorporating proper signage, lighting and wayfinding
- To address drainage, flooding, and erosion issues throughout the parks and also limit negative impacts to the nearby riparian zone
- To research the addition of facilities along greenways that enhance recreational experiences and protect valuable ecosystems
- To research the implementation of a trail system with meaningful connections to schools, recreational facilities and businesses
- To be proactive in protection of unique natural open spaces along Big Fossil Creek, Little Fossil Creek and their tributaries





LEVEL OF SERVICE

The Level of Service is a measurement of usable park acres per 1,000 persons. The Level of Service is necessary for the City representatives and citizens to understand the importance of the role of the park system in Haltom City and to help support essential decisions in future parks, recreation and open space development.

The Level of Service standards for Haltom City is analyzed based on:

- A broad scope beginning with National Recreation and Park Association standards, then tailored for statewide, regional, and then community norms to make an analysis that is specific to Haltom City
- Derived from 2019 population estimate, focus group input and stakeholder input
- Professional opinion from local guidelines and the firm's work experience

It is important to consider:

- Undeveloped or unusable parkland will not be factored in the equation
- Acreage of private recreational facilities and golf courses will not be studied in this analysis
- Open spaces on public spaces and campuses are considered in the Level of Service analysis only if they are open to the public during non school hours.


The National Park and Recreation Standards for the Level of Service is a nationwide measurement of usable parkland acres and does not take into account the local standards of a city. The measurement of Level of Service is important, and should be specific to Haltom City. The City should develop their own Level of Service to fit community needs that can be maintained at a high level.



CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED)



What is CPTED?

- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design
- CPTED is a plan or project that uses specific design principles to work toward deterring criminal behavior while positively impacting the image and usage of an area or facility.

Why is it useful?

- CPTED is useful because it can be a creative and inexpensive way to change how to manage areas to deter criminal activity.



What are the Four Main Principles?

1) Access Control — Using the layout of your environmental design to physically limit the access and egress points. This practice can also guide users, both positive and negative, to a specific direction within the park. Controlling access makes negative users feel uncomfortable and less apt to commit a crime.

2) Surveillance — Involves the elimination of physical barriers that inhibit the casual observer from scrutinizing behaviors inside a space. Surveillance is enhanced by lighting, proper placement of shrubbery, well-placed windows, elimination of physical barriers, and architecture and social commitment.

3) Territorial Reinforcement — This concept involves facilitating the process of turning an area over to legitimate users who will take ownership of the space and care for it. This helps eliminate or reduce nuisance behaviors because bad actors using the space receive increased monitoring.

4) Maintenance and Management — Keeping areas “clean and green” is the minimum standard for scheduled maintenance. Have a plan and take the extra steps to create a clean, well-kept area for your patrons. Do not let things like graffiti, garbage and/or damaged property be seen by your positive users. Have staff locate, clean and fix issues before your park is open or highly populated.

- It is important to note that in parks some of your biggest assets when utilizing CPTED is park users (sometimes called actors).
- Incorporate these users in your plan, and promote usage of frequent users and people who have eyes on the space (observers).

PARK UPGRADES-NEEDS



Haltom City has successfully developed several parks over the past ten year planning period. In order to continuously enhance and compliment the existing park system, additional parks need upgrades over the next decade. Public input, city staff, and professional opinions suggest that parks need additional upgrades. The renovation of existing parks and the quality of facilities and design ranked as the upmost importance to the citizens of Haltom City. The following pages list of park-by-park upgrades needed in Haltom City through the year 2029:

PLAYGROUND PARKS

PARRISH ROAD PARK

Parrish Road Park is a small playground park with the primary need of new amenities. The needs are playground equipment and site amenities.

BIRDVILLE TRAILS PARK

Birdville Trails Park is the newest park opened in 2016 and is still in great condition. In order to keep the park up to date and safe for the community, it is important to periodically update park features. The needs are art gardens, trail linkages, sculptures, and lighting.

HALTOM ROAD PARK

Haltom Road Park was recently updated with a Veterans Memorial in 2017. This park is highly used by residents and needs some additional elements. The needs are an all inclusive playground, playground amenities, an amphitheater, space for food vendors, a pavilion, botanical gardens, enhanced landscaping and additional lighting.



LITTLE FOSSIL PARK

Little Fossil Park was redesigned and updated in 2014. Little Fossil park is frequently used by residents and needs to be maintained and upgraded to make sure the park meets the demand. The needs are a playground and parking.

PECAN PARK

Pecan Park is a beautiful 5 acre park, however, there are some essential elements missing and park practices that could increase perceptions of safety in the park. The needs are a basketball court, soccer goals, all inclusive playground, sprayground, site amenities, a pavilion, additional lighting and a restroom facility.



REVERE PARK

Revere Park was constructed in 2013 and provides a large open lawn space. In order to increase park usage, additional facilities are needed. The needs are a playground, site amenities, shade structures and lighting.

SANDY OAKS PARK

Sandy Oaks Park provides a vast range of amenities, however, Bernice Street bisects the park. In order to meet the growing need of quality design of facilities, updated facilities are needed. The needs are a playground, a dog park, restroom and maintenance.



BROADWAY PARK

Broadway Park is located directly behind the recreation center and offers a wide range of passive and active recreational opportunities. It is important to maintain high quality amenities at Broadway Park to verify that the changing needs of the city are met. The needs are sprayground enhancements, an outdoor basketball court, a playground, soccer and football fields, a pavilion and parking.



BUFFALO RIDGE PARK

Buffalo Ridge Park is an expansive park with a large amount of greenspace, trails, and recreational amenities. To ensure a high level in usage and safety in the park, upgrades are needed. The needs are wayfinding and signage, trailheads, an all inclusive playground, a dog park, nature trails, a disc golf course, interpretative signage, bicycle support facilities, a restroom and parking.





NORTH PARK

North Park is a 40 acre complex with multiple sports and recreation facilities. North Park needs restoration to become the premiere park in Haltom City. The needs are site improvements to fields, a playground, trails, a pavilion, an amphitheater, site amenities for passive recreation, a concession stand, tree plantings, parking, signage, a restroom, lighting, and maintenance staff and equipment.

- Since 2008, North Park has been on the implementation schedule to add recreational facilities. With the emphasis placed on developing North Park as a premiere site for Haltom City, the team has designed conceptual designs for the project. It is important to note that North Park is located in a floodplain and significant work will be needed upstream and along Big Fossil Creek to alleviate the flooding in the park.

WHITES BRANCH PARK

Constructed in 2012 and updated in 2015, Whites Branch Park is in great condition. In order for this park to sufficiently meet the needs of the citizens, upgrades should be provided through the park. The needs are signage and wayfinding, a playground, interpretive signage, an amphitheater, security lighting and bicycle support facilities.

BRANDING

Based on Focus Group meetings, there is a need to redesign the parks system through branding. Branding is promoting a product through a distinctive design or brand. The brand is how the City identifies their parks and recreation system: through mailers, the website, social media posts and park signage.

The need in Haltom City is to launch a new visual brand through park signage. The City has successfully implemented uniform park signs, but there is a need to upgrade the branding efforts.

TRAIL NEEDS



Based on public input, the citizen's desire for multi-purpose and nature trails was high. The majority of the existing parks have multi-purpose looped trails in the City. In addition to looped trails, the City also offers linear trails for connectivity. Buffalo Ridge Trail is approximately three miles of concrete trail that meanders through the woods, ultimately connecting Buffalo Ridge Park, Haltom City High School and Whites Branch Park. Little Fossil Trail is approximately 1.12 miles of concrete along Little Fossil Creek that connects Little Fossil Park and Haltom Road Park. The needs are additional trails to make logical connections between parks, schools, residential neighborhoods and commercial areas, nature trails, wayfinding and signage, kiosks and trailheads, rest areas with a small pavilion, benches, picnic tables and bike maintenance stations.



NATURAL AREA & OPEN SPACE NEEDS



It is important to protect valuable ecosystems in a park system. Big Fossil Creek and Little Fossil Creek should be preserved as unique natural spaces, which help protect the ecology of the area and provide spaces for passive and active recreation. With preservation of these natural spaces in mind, it is important to be proactive by continuously monitoring efforts and upgrading amenities. The needs are to protect Little Fossil Creek, Big Fossil Creek and their tributaries, plant native species within the park system, and provide interpretive signage along existing and future greenways.



NEW PARK NEEDS

Over the past ten year planning period, the City of Haltom City has successfully acquired and developed several parks, including: Whites Branch, Revere Park and Birdville Trails Park. Due to the fact that Haltom City has developed these parks, the need for new parks is not in high demand. When asked what the most important element of parks are in the future, the survey respondents ranked Quality as the most important with a weighted score of 318, Maintenance as the second most important with a weighted score of 280 and Number of Facilities as fifth most important with a weighted score of 59. At this time, the need for additional parks is low but should always be considered if the acquisition of park land arises and supports the goals and objectives of this plan.



SWIMMING POOLS

The City of Haltom City does not currently provide a public swimming pool for its residents. Swimming pools rank number three on the citizen survey, however, there was no talk of swimming pools in public input meetings or focus group meetings held. Due to the cost of construction, maintenance, and staffing of a public pool, swimming pools are not needed at this time. The aquatic need in Haltom City can be satisfied with the construction of spraygrounds.

DOG PARKS

Haltom City does not currently provide a Dog Park for its residents. Dog Parks ranked number two on the citizen survey and there is a need to construct a dog park in the City to meet the demand.

RECREATIONAL NEEDS



The City of Haltom City has one recreation center located at Broadway Park. Based on public input, there is currently a need for additional indoor recreational space. The current recreation center is small and does not efficiently support the demands of the community. There is roughly equal demand from the citizens whether the existing facility needs to be expanded or a new facility needs to be constructed based on public input. The needs are multi-purpose rooms, a new indoor recreation center, an expansion of the existing center and variety of recreational programs.



ATHLETIC NEEDS

Football - Haltom City Pee Wee Football Association runs the youth football league. Currently, 238 boys and girls play football in the league and the games are typically played on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Three football fields are located at Broadway Park and they adequately accommodate the current and projected participation for football. However, since the fields are located in the outfields of the softball and baseball fields, there is a need for a location designated for the football fields. Currently, the main concerns at the existing fields are drainage, lack of parking at Broadway Park and the need for a concession stand.

The following table shows the existing and future needs for football based on a growth rate over 2% for the next ten years. It is estimated that each field has a capacity of six games on Saturdays and three games on Wednesdays.

Basketball – Basketball is played by approximately 250 boys and girls at the indoor basketball courts located at the Indoor Recreational Center at Broadway Park. Currently, the basketball court at Broadway Park can accommodate an average of 10 to 12 games every Saturday. The biggest concern regarding basketball is the lack of outdoor facilities.

The amount of basketball players in Haltom City has increased significantly over the last few years. The table below shows the existing and future needs for basketball facilities based on a growth rate of 4% given the increase in popularity of this sport in Haltom City. If the number of teams keeps increasing significantly, additional games will need to be played on different days of the week or additional indoor courts will need to be constructed.

Soccer – The Department of Parks and Recreation runs the Soccer program. Currently, 339 boys and girls play soccer in Haltom City. The games are currently played on Saturdays on a soccer field owned by the Birdville Independent School District. The practices are held at various locations throughout Haltom City such as schools, churches and open fields. The city does not own any designated soccer fields or practice spaces.

Due to the fact that the Soccer Association has no dedicated space, the City needs to provide soccer fields for game play and practices.

It is estimated that youth soccer will grow at a rate of approximately 4% per year due to its popularity. Based on the carrying capacity of six games per field per Saturday, the following table shows the existing needs for soccer facilities:

Volleyball – The Department of Parks and Recreation runs the volleyball program. Currently, 80 girls from 10 to 14 years of age play in the volleyball league. Approximately three to four games are played every Friday at the indoor facility located at the Indoor Recreational Center at Broadway Park.

Considering the fact that six volleyball games can be held every Friday, the needed infrastructure for volleyball is currently being met and the available space will accommodate a growth rate of 4% per year. The table below shows the needs for volleyball courts.

Dedicated indoor volleyball courts are not currently needed.

Adult Softball – Currently, 870 adults play softball at the field located at North Park. Approximately three to five games are held on Thursdays and Fridays. Considering the fact that the field located at North Park is used exclusively for adult softball, the needs are currently being satisfied. The only current need is the addition of a scoreboard at the field.

The table below shows the existing and future need for adult softball fields based on a growth rate of 2%. If a higher growth rate occurs, adult softball can be played on other days of the week, given the fact that the field will not be occupied by other programs or leagues.

Youth Softball – Haltom City Girls Softball runs the softball program in Haltom City. Currently 218 girls divided into eight teams play at the three existing fields located at Little Fossil Park. The games are held every day of the week except Wednesdays and Sundays. The existing infrastructure is sufficient for the current number of teams based on the fact that each field has a capacity of six games per day. The needs for youth softball are additional practice spaces, parking and a sound system for the fields.



Baseball – Haltom City Youth Baseball runs the baseball program at Haltom City. There are 43 teams in the league, and a total of 568 players. The teams practice at local schools and churches and play games from Monday through Saturday. Each team typically plays two games per week. The games are played at the three fields located at Broadway Park. The Youth Baseball League currently provides fields for U6 – U12. Since the City has only three fields and four different age groups, the organization uses temporary fences and shorter base paths for the different groups. New and additional fields are needed as the sport continues to grow in Haltom City. New and additional fields are also needed in town in order for the opportunity to host large tournaments. It is important to construct batting cages and warm-up areas in close proximity to existing and proposed baseball fields.

- Replace the existing playground to improve aesthetics of the park
- Provide and install new benches, picnic tables and trash receptacles to expand passive recreational opportunities

 - Work closely with nearby community (observers) to keep eyes on the space



NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

BIRDVILLE TRAILS PARK

- Install art gardens and enhance landscaping to beautify the park
- Install lighting along the walking trail for safety and visibility
- Construct trail linkages to connect to the Fort Worth Trail system

CPTED Recommendations

- Work closely with nearby neighborhood community (observers) to keep eyes on the space



HALTOM ROAD PARK

- Construct an all-inclusive playground to provide additional recreational opportunities
- Replace existing shade structure at the playground to provide shade for park users
 - Construct an additional pavilion to provide a gathering area and added shade
- Construct an amphitheater to provide the community with a place to hold concerts, rentals, plays, etc.
- Design a botanical garden and incorporate enhanced landscaping to increase park aesthetics

- Replace old playground near the maintenance area to provide safe play opportunities
- Provide additional parking for increased usage

- Keep the park maintained at a high level and clean up vandalism around the storage area



PECAN PARK



- Construct an outdoor basketball court for active recreational needs
- Provide portable soccer goals for added practice space
- Construct an all-inclusive playground to provide for the community
- Construct a sprayground to meet the demand for aquatic facilities in the southern portion of the City
- Construct a pavilion for shade and a gathering space
- Improve site amenities by providing new benches, picnic tables and trash receptacles for greater park functionality
- Provide additional lighting throughout the park to enhance line of sight
- Build a restroom for park users
- Install security cameras to limit unwanted criminal activity



CPTED Recommendations

- Clean up graffiti on site amenities
- Trim trees along the northern property boundary fence line
- Partner with the neighbors to keep watch over the park and look for abnormal park activity

REVERE PARK



- Construct a new 2-5 year old range playground to expand usable the play area
- Plant additional trees for more shade areas
- Install additional site amenities such as benches, picnic tables and pet waste stations for passive recreational needs

CPTED Recommendations

- Territorial Reinforcement: construct a fence on the North East end to separate the business from the park
- Work with the community to keep the park safe by including the nearby residents (observers) and park users (actors) in any updates to the park

SANDY OAKS PARK

- Remove the existing playground in the southwest corner of the park, just west of Bernice Street
- Construct a newer and larger playground near the existing pavilion on the east side of Bernice Street
- Construct a dog park in the southwest corner of the park for nearby pet owners
- Repair existing restroom facility and continue to maintain at a high level

CPTED Recommendations

- Limit future development on the south side of the park between the recreational areas and the parking lot


BROADWAY PARK

- Renovate existing sprayground for increased use and install a recycling system on the sprayground to conserve water
- Construct additional sprayground to add play space to the existing water park
- Construct an outdoor basketball court for expanded active recreational opportunities
- Replace the existing baseball fields with soccer and football fields after North Park is redeveloped to meet the sport organization needs
- Construct a large pavilion for added shade and community space
- Construct additional parking spaces to help with congestion in the parking lot

CPTED Recommendations

- Keep a visible line of sight from the recreation center to the park areas
- Partner with the community to keep a watchful eye on the park throughout the day and evening





BUFFALO RIDGE PARK

- Construct an all-inclusive playground to provide a wide range of recreational opportunities
- Construct a dog park to meet the need of pet owners
- Provide signage and wayfinding elements to increase safety and the walkability along the trails
- Construct trailheads that are easily visible and accessible to increase park usage and perceptions of security
- Construct nature trails for primitive recreational usage
- Provide and install bike maintenance stations and bike racks along the trail to meet need for the bicycling community
- Construct a nine hole disc golf course for active recreational play
- Provide and install interpretive signage to provide fun and informative learning opportunities for the public
- Repair and enhance existing areas with poor drainage
- Install trail lighting for increased visibility and safety
- Construct an additional restroom facility to meet the need for the anticipated park users
- Provide additional parking areas to supplement need for the public
- Install security cameras to help deter criminal activity

- Provide and install park signage and wayfinding
- Maintain visible sight lines between recreational elements and parking lots

NORTH PARK

- Develop site improvements to baseball fields to enhance active recreational opportunities
- Construct an additional playground to provide extra play space
- Install a sprayground to incorporate additional recreational services
- Construct walking trails in the park for more active recreational opportunities
- Install a pavilion to provide a gathering space
- Install benches and picnic tables for passive experiences
- Construct a new concession stand to enhance park users experience and for aesthetic value
- Plant trees to provide more shade
- Install an amphitheater for community plays, musicals, concerts, etc.
- Construct an additional restroom facility to accommodate increased park usage
- Provide parking lot and signage additions to accommodate demand

CPTED Recommendations

Based on all the public input, there is demand for both the expansion of the existing facility and the construction of a new facility. It is recommended that the City conduct a feasibility study of the existing recreation center in order to better understand if a new facility or an expansion of the existing facility will better suit the needs of the community.



ATHLETIC RECOMMENDATIONS

After reviewing survey results, holding meetings with the public and City Staff, the City needs to construct additional fields. Specific existing facilities should be upgraded or improved in order to better meet the needs of the athletic organizations and the community.

TRAIL RECOMMENDATIONS



Continue to construct trail segments that result in meaningful routes. The Trail system in Haltom City should connect to schools, parks, neighborhoods and other facilities. The following actions are recommended to be implemented, if possible, in the next ten years to meet the trail needs for the citizens of Haltom City.



- Implement wayfinding elements and signage to keep areas safe and increase walkability
- Develop nature trails at Buffalo Ridge Park for primitive recreational opportunities
- Develop a trail from Buffalo Ridge to North Park to create a trail linkage
- Acquire easements and greenways to develop a trail from North Park to Buffalo Ridge Park
- Acquire and develop greenway along Big Fossil Creek to connect Haltom Road Park to Birdville Trails Park
- Construct trail linkages from Birdville Trails Park to Fort Worth Trails to provide connections within multiple cities
- Construct kiosks and trail heads along the trail system for trail directions and easily accessible points of entry
- Install bike racks and maintenance stations to accommodate a growing cycling community
- Install exercise stations to meet active needs of the citizens
- Construct pavilions or picnic areas for passive recreational needs and rest areas
- Install lighting to address safety concerns
- Provide additional restrooms to meet increased usage of trails



NATURAL AREA & OPEN SPACE RECOMMENDATIONS

To continue to maintain and protect unique natural resources such as Big Fossil and Little Fossil Creeks and their tributaries. In order to conserve the natural spaces in the City and maintain active and passive recreational opportunities, the following actions are recommended to be completed within the next ten years to meet the needs for the citizens of Haltom City.

- Construct meaningful amenities such as benches, picnic areas, kiosks, etc along trails
- Construct improvements along Big Fossil Creek in North Park to provide relief of flooding
- Plant native species within the park system for beautification
- Provide lighting along greenbelts for visibility and safety



NEW PARK RECOMMENDATIONS

If the opportunity to acquire additional land arises, Haltom City should pursue the acquisition of park land to meet park and open space goals and objectives. At this time, it is not necessary or recommended to acquire additional parkland.

SWIMMING POOLS

Due to the fact that swimming pools are expensive to construct, operate and maintain, it is recommended to construct a sprayground at Broadway Park and Pecan Park to meet the aquatic needs of the City.

DOG PARKS

It is recommended to fence the southwestern corner of Sandy Oaks Park for a small dog park for the neighboring residents. It is also recommended to research the feasibility of a 12-15 acre lawn area for a dog park at Buffalo Ridge Park.

RECREATIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS



Based on the demand for active indoor recreational opportunities expressed by the citizens in focus group meetings, the survey and the public input meetings, it is apparent that there is a need for more indoor recreational space. Based on all the public input, there is demand for both the expansion of the existing facility and the construction of a new facility. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

This 2019-2029 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan includes five key elements:

- ❖ **Public Input** information
- ❖ **Assessments of Needs** of the Parks, Recreation and Open Space system in Haltom City
- ❖ **Recommendations based on the Needs Analysis** for the Parks, Recreation and Open Space System
- ❖ **Formation of Priorities** for the next ten years
- ❖ **Implementation Schedule** with estimated costs over the next ten years

Public Input

Citizen Survey

- 93% of respondents answered that existing facilities should be upgraded and or improved to include additional facilities
- 80% said parks should connect to neighborhoods, residential areas, and businesses
- 66% of respondents rated the existing parks and recreational facilities as excellent and good
- 89% stated that North Park should be redeveloped as the premiere Park in the City
- 91% STATED PARKS AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES ARE WELL WORTH THE COST TO TAXPAYERS
- 33% of respondents said to construct a new recreation facility while 31% said to expand the existing recreation center
- The top four facilities residents would like to see in Haltom City from 1st to Last: Disc Golf, Dog Parks, Swimming Pools, Nature Trails, and Fishing Piers
- When asked what the most important decision regarding the future of Parks and Recreation is: Quality of Facilities and Design ranked number one and Maintenance of Facilities ranked number two

It is important to note that even though disc golf ranked as the number one priority in the additional facility needs, the survey appeared to be manipulated in favor of disc golf.

Focus Groups & Public Input

- Existing parks need to be upgraded and enhanced
- The indoor recreation center needs to be expanded or a newer and larger facility is needed
- Lighting throughout the park system is needed for visibility and security

- Outdoor basketball courts are needed throughout the system
- Dog parks are desired
- Restrooms are needed at neighborhood and community parks
- All-Inclusive playgrounds are needed
- Branding and programming are needed
- North Park should be developed as a premier park
- Trail connections are desired for recreational walking and connectivity

Level of Service

The Level of Service for Haltom City is currently 5.48 acres of parkland per 1,000 residents. The City should maintain 5.0 - 5.5 acres per 1,000 residents at a high level to adequately serve the community and local demands.

Parks, Recreation and Open Space System Recommendations

Based on the citizen survey, city staff input and professional opinion, a list of recommendations for the Parks, Recreation and Open Space System was developed.

Park Recommendations

- To construct all-inclusive playgrounds
- To construct new playgrounds at various parks
- To redevelop North Park
- To incorporate a water recycling system for the existing sprayground at Broadway Park
- To provide lighting and security cameras throughout the park system to increase safety
- To provide and install site amenities
- To construct restrooms
- To construct dog parks
- To construct outdoor basketball courts
- To implement art in parks and enhanced landscaping
- To plant trees for added shade
- To construct disc golf courses

Trails

- To develop the Buffalo Ridge Park to North Park trail linkage
- To develop the Haltom Road Park to Birdville Trails Park trail connection
- To develop the Birdville Trails Park Trail to link to the Fort Worth Trail System
- To implement wayfinding and signage
- To implement site amenities
- To install lighting and restrooms

Branding

To design and implement a new brand that revitalizes the logo, park signage, mailers, website, etc that is unique to Haltom City, eye catching and uniform throughout. It is recommended that the City rebrand in-house or partner with a consulting firm that specializes in marketing.

New Park Recommendations

Over the past decade, Haltom City has successfully acquired and developed Whites Branch Park, Revere Park and Birdville Trails Park. Due to the development of these parks and input from the community, it is apparent that the need for acquiring new parkland is not high.

Swimming Pools

Due to the high cost of constructing, operating and maintaining a swimming pool, it is not recommended that the City constructs a public swimming pool facility. In order to satisfy the aquatic need within the community, the city should constructs additional spraygrounds at Broadway Park and Pecan Park.

Dog Parks

It is recommended to offer a dog park at Buffalo Ridge Park and Sandy Oaks Park.

Recreational Recommendations

It is recommended that City conduct a feasibility study of the existing recreation center to better understand if a new facility or an expansion of the existing facility will better suit the needs of the community.

Athletic Recommendations

- To redevelop fields and supporting facilities at North Park
- To provide portable soccer goals at Pecan Park for practice space
- To construct a basketball court at Broadway Park and Pecan Park
- To repurpose the existing baseball fields as regulation soccer and football fields at Broadway Park after the development of North Park

I only play disc golf at north park. My request is that the restrooms be open 24/7.

Disc golf is a sport growing exponentially in size and popularity and Haltom City deserves another disc golf course

I think the North Park disc golf course needs some attention. I've played at over 20 of the courses in DFW, and I believe North Park has one of the best course layouts, but is one of the most poorly maintained. Water drainage is a big issue.
