PUBLIC NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

Remember to sign up for our upgraded public notification system. This program gives us the ability to maximize our reach when immediate notifications are necessary in "imminent threat to life" situations. If you already receive Nixle alerts your data will transfer over, but you are encouraged to create a new account and add your contact and location information and subscribe.

OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS

As a reminder, the City's outdoor warning system is activated for the following:

- Winds of 70 mph or greater
- Hail 1.5" in diameter or larger
- And/or signs of tornado rotation.

Our system activates automatically if we're included in a Tornado Warning polygon issued by the National Weather Service.

HEAT SAFETY

Texas is known for its scorching hot summers with temperatures often soaring to dangerous levels. While the summer season brings opportunities for outdoor fun, it's crucial to be aware of the potential dangers associated with high temperatures. Here are some essential tips to help you beat the heat and enjoy your summer while keeping yourself protected:

STAY INDOORS DURING HEAT WAVES

- Stay indoors in **air conditioning** whenever possible. If your home doesn't have AC, check if your area has a cooling center.
- Remain hydrated by drinking **water** and avoiding alcohol.
- Check on those **most vulnerable** to heat, including children and the elderly.
- If you must go outdoors, go early or late in the day, and dress in light-colored clothing.

HEAT SAFETY WHEN WORKING

- Drink a cup of cool **water** every 20 minutes, even if you aren't thirsty. For long jobs, drink a beverage with electrolytes.
- Take regular breaks to **rest**. During hot conditions, skipping breaks is not safe!
- Seek periodic breaks in the AC if possible. Spend time in the **shade** when outdoors.

HALTOM CITY ECONOMIC REPORT

I wanted to take a moment and inform our community on some of the major progress we have made economically in our city over the past five years to include roads, public facilities, development, tax rate, etc. Our recent independent annual audit was just presented to the City Council not more than a few weeks ago.

We welcome and encourage any citizen to come and review this report and our Budget in person at City Hall.

It is exciting as your City Manager to report such positive turnaround in our great city that will serve us well as we position ourselves to become even more economically competitive in attracting the types of businesses and amenities that our great citizens desire. *It is important to remember over the past several years the City Council has lowered the property tax rate to the lowest rate since 2010. This is remarkable considering all that we have accomplished. Some will state the values have gone up and this is true. But, in the past we were not able to lower the tax rate (that had gotten too high) in addition to the values increasing. The recent record economic growth helped us broaden the tax base to a point that we were able to take care of capital needs while at the same time significantly lowering the tax rate. When we can lower the tax rate, we can at least offset the increasing taxable values which are determined by the county appraisal district and the market.

The right kind of development is key to bring an influx of new money into our city so that it all does not fall on the shoulders of our taxpayers. Other revenue streams are starting to significantly increase like our development fees and sales tax. These other revenue streams are finally starting to outpace our property tax revenue. These other revenue streams help offset residential property taxation. In the past, we had become too dependent on a property tax rate to keep up with a crumbling infrastructure. But all that is changing. ***According to the State Comptroller we are in the top 100 cities out of 1,221 Texas cities in producing sales tax revenue.** Lowering the tax rate is also instrumental to attracting new businesses.

Our Mayor, City Council Member, and staff have been listening very carefully to our citizens for the past several years. ***We have funded more road improvements over the past five years than ever before.** The below list of "Road Repair & Reconstruction" will communicate the commitment this council, city staff have made and will continue to make on road replacement and repair. Streets take a long time to build through the design and engineering phase and through the construction phase. It is important to remember when roads are replaced the drainage, water, and sewer infrastructures are also replaced. These added costs and inherent time delays are often not considered. We do not build new streets over 20- to 50-year-old utilities. Additionally, we must work and coordinate with other non-city utilities such as gas lines, fiber optics, etc.

As the below list and summary illustration will show we have committed approximately \$72 million to road replacement and repair just from adding the projects from the last five years and the current projects that are funded and under the design phase. Additionally, we are planning another estimated \$36 million in future road projects. Our City Council the past several years has committed more to street replacement/repair than at any time in the past. This total is approximately \$100 million tax dollars at work for all. DEVELOPMENT UPDATES

The citizens also overwhelmingly voted for the much-needed replacements of City Hall, Police Department, and Fire Station #3. We were also finally able to relocate and remodel the new Senior Center so that our seniors would have the necessary accommodations and room that they need and deserve. The city staff is now paid competitively with our neighboring cities so that we may attract and retain the best staff possible. Our citizens deserve the best service that we can provide. We are working diligently to that goal.

Several years ago, city leaders and administrative staff produced a new economic development plan. The old plan of just waiting for a “ship to come in” was not working. Some in the past thought location and access was enough. It was not enough. Time and decay had proven this to be true. Those things are great assets, but it still takes money to be competitive. Although, we have a great city with great people we did not have an abundance of discretionary income amongst our citizens. When there is no significant money then there is no shortcut to attracting development. In fact, development leaves if there is no discretionary income, high tax rate, and low valuations. This is exactly the scenario we were in, and the economic decisions of the distant past almost placed us in a point of no return as it relates to revitalizing our great city.

We knew we needed to diversify and attract other revenue generating businesses. Although we love all our small businesses, we had become too saturated with certain businesses that simply did not create enough revenue to produce an environment of community prosperity. So, we went back to the basics, and we are turning the city around.

BACK TO THE BASICS PLAN

Our **“Back to the Basics Plan”** included a three-pronged/step approach to getting more money in this town so that we can create an environment where businesses prosper and families flourish.

STEP ONE: Attract the highest and best use (profitable) businesses by rezoning for large distribution and warehouse centers.

- These business parks will serve us moving forward in the day of E-commerce.
 - They bring jobs, industry, symbiotic partnerships, and a significant influx of new daytime money to the city.
 - These new employees now are bringing shoppers from other cities to purchase from our local merchants to fill their cars with gas, patronize our businesses, and eat locally.
- These types of developments insulate cities from recessionary times, pandemics, and inflationary impacts.
 - During tough economic times cities that are dependent more on primarily just retail do not weather the economic storm as well.

STEP TWO: Attract new residents at a higher income level so that there is an influx of new nighttime money to sustain and draw new merchants.

STEP THREE: Increase our code enforcement efforts by enlarging the code department. We are now handling over 5,000 code cases a year to clean up our city.

All these efforts have created more than a **billion dollars** of new overall valuations. An additional billion dollars of new growth will be realized once the current projects are complete over the next several years. **This new growth will produce approx. 5,000 new jobs and 5,000 new residents.**

Additionally, the City Council recently approved a **740+ acre Tax Increment Revitalization Zone (TIRZ)**. This zone follows the corridors of Denton Highway (South of Loop 820) to Belknap and Belknap to Beach Street. This zone is designed to provide incentive for developers to revitalize the South part of Haltom City. Once our new growth continues to mature, this TIRZ District will be in place for developers to revitalize the Southern portion of our city. **This is the first revitalization zone ever created and funded by any Haltom City Council EVER.**

The city currently has development agreements with developers to bring numerous restaurants, retail, and entertainment. As soon as the interest rates come down and the economy bounces back these developments will move forward. We are also negotiating several other development possibilities that will attract the types of businesses and amenities that our citizens desire and deserve in our city. It needs to be understood that these retail developments would not be possible if we did not utilize the **“Back to the Basics Plan”** described above.



If we kept doing what we always did, we would have gotten more of the same: a declining city with a high tax rate, low valuations that yield low equity wealth to the owner, low alternative revenue streams, and no discretionary money to provide for road replacement, public facilities, and city services. Clearly, these facts reinforce the future would have continued to place all the pressure on the shoulders of the residents with little return on investment. You might hear from some about vacant buildings. This is a reality and always will be a reality to some extent. All cities lose businesses and gain businesses every year. Our commercial vacancy rate is lower than some of our surrounding neighbors. Property owners will generally start making improvements and updating their buildings as our city starts to attract new developments and our economic turnaround continues to bring new money into our town. The plan is working. Things are being done and progress is being made. Recent accomplishments that have never been realized in our city's past prove all the above. Remember: The plan is working. Things are being done and progress is being made.

SUMMER'S HERE: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THOSE HOT SUMMER DAYS AND YOUR FUR CHILD

Suns out and that means it's time to be outside whether its long walks on the beach or down the street and around the corner you must remember the ground get **HOT HOT HOT** and burnt paws are no fun!!!

Concrete and asphalt are much hotter than the air around you. The rule of thumb is place your barehand on them and hold for 7 seconds. If its to hot for your hand its too hot for your fur kid. If you have a pup that just must get its daily walk in there are some alternatives to be mindful of. They do make some sweet kicks (shoes) made just for your fur baby. We have even found crocs for pets! If wrangling your fur kid and strapping on shoes does not seem like an ideal extracurricular activity for you, try walking only in grassy areas or make it an evening stroll.

Please always remember to keep your pets on a leash and display their rabies tag proudly on their collar or harness.

Haltom City Animal Services receives countless calls during the hot summer months about dogs being left in cars. Please do not take your pets with you on errand running unless you are planning on taking them inside with you. Be Prepared and plan ahead.



ADOPTIONS

Haltom City Animal Services (HCAS) has a wonderful adoption program, and we invite you to consider our shelter when looking for your next pet. Available animals may be viewed during normal shelter hours. We also have a play yard and a play room where you can get to know your new best friend and find out if the match is right.



Based on age and health, most of our animals receive all necessary vaccinations before adoption.

\$60 for all animal adoptions, microchip included

All animals are required to be spayed or neutered after they are adopted, with documentation provided to the shelter. This is the responsibility of the adopter, and is required by both city and state laws.

You must be 18 or over, with a valid I.D. to adopt an animal. A legal contract is required for each adoption, and HCAS has the right to refuse adoption to anyone.

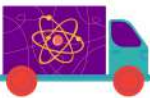
